Briefly describe the selection process including why this process was established and how it works.

Representatives of the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness are chosen in three ways: 1) Seven government members are appointed by the Government Providers group consisting of local, state, and federal agencies; 2) Fifteen members are elected by the Chicago Alliance to End Homelessness, including six consumers elected from the Consumers Commission, six service providers elected by the Service Providers Commission, two members from the Chicago Alliance Board, and the CEO of the Chicago Alliance; 3) One at-large member from the philanthropic community is chosen by the Grantmakers Concerned with Ending Homelessness.

The selection process was established to ensure that the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness was fully representative of all the entities impacted by and serving people who are homeless. The Planning Council focuses on the Plan to End Homelessness in relation to HUD funding, implementation of HMIS, and reviewing data related to the homeless system.

Yes. If our CoC were provided with additional funding, the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness would designate an entity to be responsible for all HUD activities described above. The Planning Council has designated the Chicago Alliance to End Homelessness to organize the application for HUD funding and would be strongly considered to provide project oversight and monitoring in the future, depending on the scope of HUD funding to be administered.

HAC has its roots in the Access to Community Care and Emergency Supports and Services (ACCESS) demonstration project funded by the Center for Mental Health Services. The mission of HAC is to integrate existing services and supports, and to strategically stimulate the creation of resources in the Chicago metro area for the purpose of strengthening the network of care for people who are homeless and have a serious mental illness. The goals of the Homeless Action Committee are to: (1) Promote and participate in the integration and collaboration among local, state, and federal government, and private organizations in order to create an infrastructure for seamless service delivery; (2) increase housing options and access to appropriate housing; and (3) advocate for increased resources to sustain and expand wraparound services targeted to at-risk populations in order to prevent homelessness.

There was an increase in nearly 300 beds for Emergency Shelter between 2007 and 2008. The most significant increase came from one program, Pacific Garden Mission. This organization moved to a new location, consolidated programs, and increased their capacity. Beds were also added to other programs for single women and men to ensure sufficient coverage.

Briefly describe the reasons for the change:

Transitional Housing: Yes

Briefly describe the reasons for the change:

The number of TH beds for singles decreased by 244 and the number of TH beds for families decreased by 163 between 2007 and 2008. Several transitional housing programs had to reduce bed capacity or close operations due to loss of federal funding or agency decisions to redirect its programs. Additionally, several transitional housing programs converted to permanent housing models and therefore moved to the permanent housing inventory.

Permanent Housing: Yes

Briefly describe the reasons for the change, including changes in beds designated for chronically homeless persons:

Permanent housing increased by nearly 700 beds/units between 2007 and 2008. Permanent supportive housing projects that were previously under development became available for occupancy in 2007-2008. The increase can also be attributed to the conversion of transitional programs to permanent housing. Chronic homeless beds had a net increase of over 270, which is reflective of the new permanent housing programs that targeted long-term homeless and/or unsheltered homeless that often served chronically homeless individuals.

Briefly describe the CoC's plans to overcome challenges and barriers:

In early October 2008, the Chicago CoC transitioned its HMIS software from Softscape to Bowman System's ServicePoint. A major barrier in the original HMIS implementation that began in 2005 was the inability of the Softscape system to generate reports, including the AHAR. ServicePoint is HUD compliant and can produce the APR, the AHAR and other CoC-wide reports, and customized reports that will enable agencies to track client demographics and service utilization.

The HMIS Lead Agency continues to work with the CoC and Abt Associates to provide technical assistance to participating agencies. For many agencies, HMIS is their introduction to information technology. Also, many agencies experience high rates of staff turnover, which contributes to the need for training. All participating HMIS agencies will receive training on the new HMIS, and the HMIS Lead Agency will continue to provide technical assistance to agencies as they adopt the new system.

The CoC continues to increase HMIS Bed Coverage rates. The coverage for Transitional Housing has increased to 87%, while the coverage rate for Permanent Supportive Housing has increased to 75%. Between 2007 and 2008, the coverage rate for Permanent Individual beds increased from 65% to 75%, while the coverage for Permanent Family beds increased from 33% to 73%. Emergency Shelter is currently the one housing type that has less than 65% coverage.

Emergency Shelter is currently the one housing type that has less than 65% bed coverage in HMIS. Whereas ES Family beds have 87% coverage in HMIS, ES Individual Beds are covered at 27%. This is mainly due to the fact that one very large Emergency Shelter that accounts for over 40% of the emergency individual beds is not participating in HMIS. This provider is scheduled for training on the new HMIS system, and the CoC and the HMIS Lead Agency will work with this provider and other agencies to start participating in our new and improved HMIS.

The Bowman ServicePoint HMIS will also provide Emergency Shelter and other housing providers with the potential to utilize ScanPoint technology. This feature enables providers to issue I.D. cards to clients. Once I.D. Cards are issued to clients, the provider can scan the cards as clients enter and exit shelters as opposed to manually entering client data with each client entry and exit. Additionally, the new software offers easier mechanisms for entering and exiting clients into the HMIS, which was a huge barrier for Emergency Shelter participation and quality under the old software application.

The HMIS lead agency also manages the Emergency Shelter contracts and has made HMIS participation a condition of funding, and will increase the monitoring of HMIS usage. Additionally, the HMIS SOPs have been updated to reflect a streamlined process for agencies to have users granted access the HMIS.

Another feature that will be used to encourage all providers to utilize the system and enter quality data into the HMIS, is the much improved reporting capability of ServicePoint. Agencies were not enthusiastic about utilizing the Softscape system because they were not able to generate reports based on the data that they entered into the system. ServicePoint, from day one of implementation, includes the APR and other reports that will enable providers to meet funders reporting requirements and to track client demographics and service utilization.

Throughout 2008, the HMIS Lead Agency has been working vigorously with Abt Associates on addressing data quality issues at the agency level. As a result, HMIS data quality reports were developed to monitor usage levels, each participating programs entry of universal data elements into the HMIS, and programs entry and exit of clients in HMIS.

In January 2008, the HMIS Lead Agency hosted a 3-day HMIS Technical Assistance Seminar for agencies currently participating in HMIS. An introductory session explained the importance of the CoCs participation in HMIS, the need to participate in the AHAR, and the requirement that agencies enter Universal Data Elements into the system and properly enter and exit clients. Each program was given data quality reports that displayed the programs performance on the Universal Data Elements. After the introductory session, two and a half days of individualized technical assistance meetings were offered to agencies, so that they could receive one-on-one assistance understanding the reports and guidance on how to improved data quality, as well as answers to any technology-related questions.

The data quality improvement effort has continued since the initial meetings in January 2008, and agencies have received several reports charting their improvement or need for improvement related to entry of Universal Data Elements and Entry and Exit of clients. Work continues through regular reports and monitoring to ensure that agency usage/data levels remain compliant moving forward.

The new Bowman ServicePoint HMIS will also assist in achieving and maintaining a higher level of data quality. In the new system, all Universal Data Elements are grouped together on the basic client intake screen. This means that users will need to enter data for all U.D.E.s in order to enter a client into the HMIS system. Previously, in the Softscape System, the U.D.E.s were spread across several intake and assessment screens. It was possible to enter a client into the system without answering the question on disability status, since this data element was included in a Special Needs Screening Assessment and not on the Basic Client Intake Assessment. Grouping all of the U.D.E.s on one screen and requiring their completion in order to intake a client into the system should bring completion of U.D.E.s to 100% over the next year.

In the old Softscape system, the HMIS Lead Agency would run data quality reports and share them with HMIS participating agencies. The new system features data usage and quality reports as part of its reporting capabilities. Participating agencies will be able to run these reports on a regular basis to chart their data quality instead of being dependent on the Lead Agency for this guidance. However, the HMIS Lead Agency will continue to run usage and data quality reports on a regular basis and provide technical assistance to participating agencies.

Finally, the new Bowman ServicePoint system includes a feature that enables System Administrators to run reports on duplicate clients and to merge duplicate records for a client into one record. Regular system-wide use of this feature and elimination of duplicate records will contribute to higher data quality and more accurate reports.

Describe the existing policies and procedures used to ensure that valid program entry and exit dates are recorded in the HMIS.

As described previously, the HMIS Lead Agency worked with Abt Associates to develop a data quality report that indicated programs entry and exit of clients in HMIS. The report has been run and shared with each participating HMIS agency several times throughout 2008. Programs that appeared to have significant program overutilization were flagged for invalid entry and exit dates. The HMIS Lead Agency communicated this to agency Executive Directors in writing, and Lead Agency staff continuously provided technical assistance to agencies on this issue. Moving forward with implementation of the new system HMIS agency-administrators will routinely monitor data quality and ensure valid entry and exit dates.

Provider sites conducted a direct count of all clients present on the night of the P.I.T. count. Participating providers were given standardized forms on which to record single individuals, families with children (and family relationship either head of household or other family member), and characteristics such as age, gender, race and ethnicity. All providers received training on how to conduct the count, and were instructed to return the forms within 24 hours of the Count.

The total sheltered population decreased from 4,969 persons counted in the 2005 P.I.T. to 4,346 persons counted in the 2007 P.I.T. A significant factor in the decrease is the shift to moving homeless individuals and families to permanent housing in accordance with the Plan to End Homelessness. This has been achieved by funding new units of permanent housing as well as increasing homelessness prevention resources, and adding "housing locators" to shelter programs to facilitate movement out of shelter.

Shelter providers that participated in the 2007 Point in Time surveyed a ten percent random sample of households in each shelter. All providers received training on how to conduct the survey, and were instructed to return the surveys within 24 hours of the count. The survey contained questions regarding the subpopulation characteristics (i.e. substance abuse history, mental health history, etc.) and other demographic data, such as employment status, sources of income, and participation in mainstream benefits.

All of the survey data were entered into a database, organized by shelter and coded by household type, for tabulation and extrapolation to produce the total sheltered subpopulation results. A research consultant performed the extrapolation and data analysis. The consultant calculated the subpopulations based on extrapolating the total sample of adults that was surveyed at all shelters to the total adult population counted across all shelters, rather than extrapolating the adult population surveyed at each individual shelter to the total adult population counted at each individual shelter. This explains why the data reported in section 2J. differ from the extrapolations in the P.I.T. attachment. Moving forward with the 2009 P.I.T. Count, the CoC will work with our research partner to utilize the P.I.T. attachment chart as the model for performing extrapolations for sheltered subpopulations.

The Chicago CoC used several de-duplication techniques to ensure the data quality of the unsheltered persons count. The city was divided geographically by census tracts to ensure complete coverage and to eliminate teams crossing other teams borders. During the count, counters wore identifiers for other teams to easily identify them. Counters also distributed hats and gloves to the unsheltered individuals who were counted. The hats and gloves were all similar in type and color. During training, the counters were shown a sample of the clothing and were advised that unsheltered individuals who were wearing the hats and gloves the night of the count were given these items by other counters and thus already included in the count.

Describe the CoCs efforts, including outreach plan, to reduce the number of unsheltered homeless households with dependent children.

The results of the 2007 Point in Time Count indicated a very small number of unsheltered households (22) with children. Unfortunately this was an increase from the previous count. Unsheltered households with dependent children are rare in Chicago because of the coordinated and diverse homeless service system. CDHS and community-based agencies, as described in the next section, provide continuous city-wide street outreach that seeks to get households into shelter and permanent housing immediately. Additionally, each Chicago Public School has a Homeless Liaison that contacts the City when an unsheltered family is identified, which is met with immediate outreach.

We believe the following system-wide efforts and new targeted resources support the decrease in the number of unsheltered homeless individuals including the count of the unsheltered chronic homeless, between the 2005 and 2007 Point in Time Counts. The Chicago Department of Human Services provides 24-hour emergency assistance and service intake. Services include a crisis intervention center that offers toll-free hotline assistance, mobile assessment, and other intervention services. Calls to the City's 311 non-emergency help line are referred electronically 24 hours a day, seven days a week to the CDHS Emergency Service Center. As crisis cases are processed, the CDHS Emergency Service Teams are dispatched to provide crisis intervention, transport clients to shelters, relocate clients between shelters, or locate alternative placements as needed.

CDHS also utilizes a Homeless Outreach and Prevention (HOP) team to reach the homeless living on the street and individuals who might not actively seek out services on their own. The HOP team conducts patrols around the City and in areas of known homeless encampments between pre-dawn hours and noon. The Homeless Outreach and Prevention program focuses on engaging and building relationships with homeless persons, with the goal of placing them into services including shelter and supportive housing.

CDHS operates mobile outreach health units in a collaborative effort with the Chicago Department of Public Health. The mobile units are customized vans that are used to provide health and social services to the city's homeless population. Services include outreach, intake, mental health, and substance abuse screenings, physical examinations, health referrals, and shelter placement. The mobile units are staffed by a CDHS case worker, a Public Health nurse, and a driver.

CDHS and CoC/HUD also funds a number of delegate agencies to engage unsheltered homeless as well as day time support centers that attract persons routinely sleeping on the streets. Efforts include outreach on the City's public transportation system and in public spaces where homeless are known to congregate.

In 2005 the Department of Housing initiated a new program called the Street-to-Home Initiative, which targets permanent housing with supportive services to unsheltered homeless individuals. Clients recruited for this program came from the areas reported as having the highest concentrations of unsheltered persons in the 2005 Homeless Count. To date, 154 individuals have been assisted and 80% (123) remain stably housed. Approximately 85% are considered chronically homeless.

In addition, Chicago has also implemented two HUD Chronic Homeless Initiatives, providing 350 new units of permanent supportive housing for this population. Approximately 30% of the individuals assisted through these initiatives were routinely sleeping on the streets and other places not meant for human habitation.

The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) provides housing advocacy and cash assistance to youth aging out of foster care who are between the ages of 17.5 and 21. The program targets youth at-risk of becoming homeless and who are approaching emancipation or who have already emancipated from foster care.

Eligible youth can receive: Housing Advocacy-Services, Start-up Grants, Partial Housing Subsidy and Cash Assistance. Follow-up services are provided for minimally three months after the youth secures housing.

Youth being discharged from the foster care system routinely live in unsubsidized housing in the community. DCFS contracts with community agencies to provide housing location services that work with private-market landlords.

DCFS is an active participant in the Chicago CoC. Through DCFS' participation in constituency groups, the CoC is in agreement on DCFS' program to prevent homelessness among youth and families involved in the foster care system. No McKinney-Vento resources are used during the DCFS discharge planning process.

Health Care Discharge

Members of the Chicago CoC and two Cook County hospitals have implemented procedures aimed at preventing homeless or at-risk in-patients from being discharged to the street. However, discharging in-patients to HUD McKinney-funded transitional or permanent supportive housing programs are encouraged. A recently released study of the Chicago Housing for Health Partnership documents the cost-savings to hospitals by providing permanent supportive housing for chronically ill homeless individuals. The findings are anticipated to spur further discharge planning protocols from Health Care to avoid homelessness altogether.

In 2005, the Illinois Department of Human Services Office of Mental Health (OMH) established a Continuity of Care Agreement which outlines the protocol for placement into, and discharge from, a state mental health facility. The Agreement states that the state hospital is not to discharge a person into homelessness if there is a reasonable expectation that the person will have housing if the discharge is delayed, unless the consumer insists on being discharged and is not certifiable under the mental health code, or if after diligent search, no housing resources to pay for housing can be identified.

OMH is an active member of the Chicago CoC. Through participation in constituency groups the CoC members understand and agree that the State Mental Health facilities are prohibited from discharging patients directly into homeless-funded programs. OMH contracts with community mental health providers who have the primary responsibility of making housing placements for patients leaving state mental health facilities. These providers are responsible for abiding by the Continuity of Care agreement and HUD McKinney-Vento program rules. The state also works with contracted providers to maintain a list of non-McKinney residential programs, such as Thresholds Psychiatric and Rehabilitation Centers, and private landlords that will accept patients being discharged.

The Circuit of Cook County's Criminal Division Mental Health Court involves a team comprised of a judge, prosecutors, defense attorneys, probation officers and social service agencies to oversee mentally ill probationers to ensure compliance with treatment and monitor progress toward improved mental health. This program provides discharge planning from jail for clients that otherwise would be at high risk for occurrence or re-occurrence of homelessness.

Social service agencies led by Treatment Alternatives for Safer Communities make housing arrangements and placements for the probationers in the program. Housing is arranged with private market apartments or other non-McKinney residential programs. Housing placements include unsubsidized single-room occupancy units at Mercy Housing Lakefront Delmar Apartments.

The Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) created the Office of Reentry Management (ORM) to provide a bridge between IDOCs prison-based and community-based programs for offenders returning to the community. Prisoners are engaged at intake to begin discharge planning, with special attention paid to prisoners who were homeless prior to prison entry. Twelve months prior to release, inmates begin to identify stable housing options. IDOC's ORM staff is a leader in the CoC's Discharge Planning Committee.

The three core tenets of the Plan to End Homelessness are to: (1) prevent homelessness whenever possible; (2) rapidly re-house people when homelessness cannot be prevented; and (3) provide wraparound services that promote housing stability. The Plan calls for a transition of the homeless service system from a shelter-based system, focused on temporary fixes, to a housing-based system emphasizing long-term solutions. To that end, the inventory of homeless resources will experience an increase in interim and permanent housing, with a corresponding decrease in the number of temporary shelter beds. The Plans implementation is led by the Commissioner of the Department of Housing (DOH). DOH works closely with the Department of Human Services, which is the front-line responder to homelessness and therefore required to implement many of the changes articulated in the Plan.

The Chicago CoC (now embodied through the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness and the Chicago Alliance to End Homelessness) was the original author of the Ten-Year Plan. Therefore, the CoC strategic goals and the Plan's goals are the same.

The goals of Chicago's Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness include increasing prevention resources, increasing permanent supportive housing, and transitioning the various types of shelter into a new model focused on rapidly re-housing individuals and families. The Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness affirmed the production goals for the Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness for permanent supportive housing, interim housing, emergency shelter, and homelessness prevention resources. The production goals were developed by stakeholders of the City of Chicago, Chicago Alliance to End Homelessness, and the Corporation for Supportive Housing.
