I am writing on behalf of the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness to inform you about the new Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requirement that Continuums of Care (CoC) must rank projects, and separate them into two tiers during the annual HUD competition in the event that not enough funding is available for all projects. This letter will explain the ranking criteria used by the Planning Council to set Chicago's tiers, as well as provide information on how your agency will be impacted.

Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness

The Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness (Planning Council) is the official governing body for Chicago's homeless CoC. HUD established the CoC model to ensure continuity of services and a collaborative approach to ending homelessness in each community across the country. The Planning Council is made up of a representative group of stakeholders that strive to end homelessness in Chicago, and this includes homeless consumers, service providers, private funders, government representatives and Alliance staff and Board members. Each year the Planning Council undertakes many activities, one of which is the creation and approval of priorities for the use of HUD funding, including ranking criteria and policies. The decisions made by the Planning Council about ranking policies are final.

New HUD Tier Requirement

For the first time this year, HUD is requiring CoC's to plan for the scenario where HUD may not be able to fund all projects that request HUD funding, including renewal projects. In [the Notice of Funding Availability announcement](#), HUD stated they have \$1.61 billion dollars for CoC funding, but are projecting over \$1.63 billion in requests. Even though HUD is working to recapture unspent funds, which we hope will get added to the CoC funding amount, HUD requires CoC's to use their ranking policies to determine which projects may be at risk of not being renewed. The tier system HUD created allocates a certain dollar amount for Tier 1, and the rest of CoC dollars for Tier 2. HUD will fund all Tier 1 projects across the country before funding Tier 2 projects. Chicago's Ranking Policies

The Chicago Planning Council charged a task group with the assignment of developing this year's ranking policies. The task group was made up of Planning Council members and other key representatives from the City and the HUD McKinney Vento Committee. The Planning Council adopted the ranking policies and ranking criteria (enclosed) presented by the task group on December 19th, 2013. The task group spent much time ensuring the policies are in line with Chicago's new plan to end homelessness - Plan 2.0 - and used averages of past Evaluation Instrument scores as the basis for renewal rankings.

What This Means for You

While budget numbers are still being finalized, we expect that the Tier 1 cutoff will be at project number 161. The final cutoff number will be announced once the HUD Application is finalized, on or around January 18, 2013. Please refer to the enclosed ranking chart to find out where your projects rank.

The overwhelming majority of projects for Chicago fall into Tier 1. If this applies to your projects, then you can expect your projects to be renewed as they have in the past. This means HUD will make funding announcements within a few months of the January 18th, 2013 deadline, and the local HUD field office will begin executing grant agreements for your contracts that begin in 2013. However, because the HUD process is being completed later than in previous years, if your grant start date is in January, February or March, you may experience a delay in drawing down funds for your HUD grant. HUD expects you to continue operating the project even without drawing down funding. If this concerns you, please contact your HUD representative.

If your agency has a project that is projected to fall into Tier 2, your project is at risk of not being renewed by HUD. The Alliance and Chicago Department of Family and Support Services are working hard to submit the most competitive CoC application as possible. A competitive score in the national competition will give us the best chance of receiving enough funding to cover Tier 2 projects. However, no matter how high we score, there still remains a chance that some or all of Chicago's Tier 2 projects will not be renewed. HUD will announce this information sometime in early 2013 and we will keep you posted as soon as we are made aware of HUD's final funding decision.

We thank you for your continued commitment to ending homelessness in Chicago.

2012 HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) Program Ranking Policies
Developed by the HEARTH Funding Opportunities Task Group
Approved by the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness on 12/19/12

Eligibility

To be eligible for ranking, all projects – new and renewal – must pass all facets of the application review including:

- Projects must meet all HUD eligibility criteria.
- Projects must meet the application deadlines, as set by the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness.
- Projects must meet and adhere to the 2012 Eligibility and Funding Policies (see below);
- Renewal projects must pass the threshold criteria outlined in the 2012 NOFA Evaluation Instrument;

HUD Tiers

This year, HUD instructed CoC's to ranking projects into two tiers in the event that the funding available is insufficient to fund all projects. While HUD has stated they believe they have enough funding to cover Tier 1 projects, Tier 2 projects may be at risk of being defunded by HUD. HUD is recapturing unspent funds and there may be enough to cover some Tier 2 projects throughout the country. CoC's that score well in the national competition will have their Tier 2 projects funded before less-competitive CoC's.

Chicago CoC Ranking Order

Tier 1

1. New projects created from the reallocation of 0.06% from all housing projects, and 3.85% from all support service only projects, in the following order:
 - a. Central Referral System Project
 - b. Homeless Management Information System Expansion Project
2. HMIS Renewal Project
3. All HUD CoC Renewal Projects, in the following order:
 - a. Shelter Plus Care projects, alphabetical by project sponsor
 - b. All other CoC Permanent Housing (PH) projects (formerly known as SHP PH projects), by the average of the 2009, 2010 and 2011 Evaluation Instrument scores
4. An equitable number* of HUD CoC Transitional Housing (TH) and Support Service Only (SSO) projects, alternating by program type, in the following order, up to a dollar amount that is equal to the Tier 1 total minus the maximum amount of Collaborative Applicant CoC Planning Dollars:
 - a. By the average of the 2009, 2010 and 2011 Evaluation Instrument scores,
 - b. Taking into account additional criteria established by the Planning Council (see below)

*Equitability was established as maintaining the same TH to SSO dollar ratio in Tier 1 as in our entire CoC portfolio which is approximately 65% TH and 35% SSO.

5. Collaborative Applicant CoC Planning Dollars (new)

Tier 2

6. Remaining HUD CoC TH and SSO projects, by the average of 2009, 2010, and 2011 Evaluation Instrument scores
7. 2012 Bonus Projects selected by the New Project Selection Panel, using the following criteria to rank projects that were selected:
 - a. Agencies that have not received prior HUD CoC funding
 - b. Geographic location emphasizing the South and West sides of Chicago
 - c. Plan 2.0 priority populations
 - d. Presentation quality

Additional Criteria used for Ranking TH and SSO Projects

The Planning Council appointed a group of people without conflicts of interest to look at the TH and SSO projects that fell into Tier 2; they authorized that group to use Planning Council-approved criteria to adjust the ranking order slightly to account for the following:

- Projects that are critical to the implementation of Plan 2.0 in Tier 2
- Uneven geographic distribution of projects in Tier 2

The group was also instructed to consider the following while determining the final rank order:

- Projects in Tier 2 that were placed on funding probation in the last 3 Evaluation Instrument cycles and showed improvement in subsequent years
- Maximizing the dollar amount in Tier 1
- Ensuring categories of project types and populations were not overrepresented in Tier 2

2012 NOFA Eligibility and Funding Policies

Approved by the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness on October 26, 2012

The 2012 Eligibility Policies for HUD McKinney-Vento renewal projects are as follows:

To be eligible to submit a renewal application (Exhibit 2) projects must meet the following criteria:

- Be currently operating a HUD McKinney-Vento grant with funding ending during the calendar year 2013.
- Renewal projects that are currently operating must pass the threshold criteria outlined in the 2012 NOFA Evaluation Instrument.
- Projects must meet the application deadlines, as set by the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness.
- Any project that was on funding probation for 2011, and received technical assistance, must demonstrate an increase in Evaluation Instrument Supplement score in 2012 to be considered for renewal. Those that did not demonstrate an increase in score will have their funding reallocated.
- Projects must meet all HUD eligibility criteria, as outlined in the 2012 NOFA (yet to be released).

The 2012 Funding Policies for HUD McKinney-Vento renewal projects are as follows:

The following policies are in effect for renewing McKinney-Vento projects:

- Agency pre-administration budgets will be reduced according to the policies below, and those funds reallocated to priorities identified by the Chicago Planning Council on Homelessness: the Central Referral System and an HMIS Expansion Project. Agencies that operate more than one HUD project will be able to reduce their overall HUD grant amount by the percentages outlined below, instead of taking a percentage from each project.
 - All Supportive Service Only (SSO) projects will be reduced by 3.85%.
 - All Permanent Housing (PH), Transitional Housing (TH) and Safe Haven (SH) projects will be reduced by 0.632%, and must reduce the budget without reducing the number of units served by the project.
- All projects can apply for up to 10% in administrative costs for each project.
- Under the new HEARTH regulations, projects must be able to commit at least a 25% match of the grant amount except for leasing dollars, either cash or in-kind, as part of the Exhibit 2 HUD Application.
